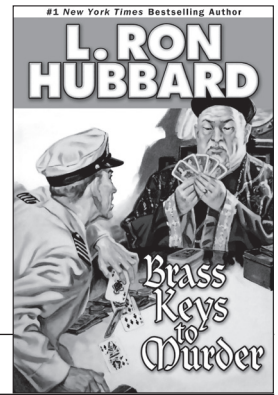


L. Ron Hubbard's *Brass Keys to Murder* Discussion Guide



STORY SUMMARY & OVERVIEW

Lieutenant Steve Craig, a respected U.S. Navy officer, suddenly finds himself accused of murdering his own father, Jeremiah Craig. With fewer than forty-eight hours to prove his innocence, Steve must evade the police while following a trail of cryptic clues that leads from a busy American waterfront to long-buried secrets connected to the China Sea. As he encounters smugglers, dangerous criminals and unexpected allies, Steve discovers that solving his father's murder will require courage, determination and careful reasoning. The author combines a fast-paced mystery with maritime adventure in a race against time where every clue matters.

HISTORICAL CONTEXT: AMERICAN MARITIME COMMERCE, EARLY TWENTIETH-CENTURY SHIPPING, AND CRIMINAL INVESTIGATION

Brass Keys to Murder is set on the American waterfront during the 1930s, when commercial shipping was one of the nation's most important industries. Merchant ships transported cargo between ports around the world while nearby U.S. Navy vessels protected American interests and maintained a presence in major harbors. Merchant captains were often responsible for protecting both their crews and valuable cargo, and disputes over recovered property could have lasting consequences. The author uses this historical reality to create the mystery surrounding the brass keys and the events that shaped Jeremiah Craig's past.

The novel also reflects the investigative methods of its time. Before DNA analysis, surveillance cameras, fingerprint databases, or computerized records, detectives relied on eyewitness testimony, handwritten logs, interviews, physical evidence and logical deduction. When *Brass Keys to Murder* was published in 1936, readers would have recognized both the bustling American waterfront and the enduring legends of the China Sea as exciting settings where history, commerce, adventure and crime could unexpectedly intersect.

As Steve interviews the people connected with Jeremiah Craig, several individuals behave suspiciously. Compare their actions and determine which raises the greatest questions.

📖 What discoveries led Steve Craig to conclude that Jeremiah Craig's murderer was present in the house that evening, and do you agree with his reasoning? By the end of the chapter, Steve pieces together several important clues that narrow the list of suspects. Evaluate whether his conclusion follows logically from the evidence available at this point.

CHAPTER THREE: SECRETS ABOARD THE MANDARIN

📖 What discoveries does Steve Craig make about the *Mandarin*, and how do they change his understanding of Jeremiah Craig's past? As Steve continues his investigation, he uncovers new information connected to the *Mandarin* and his father's earlier experiences at sea. Based on the evidence available so far, develop your own theory about the keys, the hidden treasure and the identity of the murderer.

CHAPTER FIVE: NEW ALLIES AND GROWING SUSPICIONS

📖 What does Sally Randolph's willingness to help Steve Craig reveal about the dangers both characters are willing to face in pursuit of the truth? Steve asks Sally for help even though it places both of them in greater danger. Discuss how trust and cooperation become increasingly important as the investigation grows more dangerous.

📖 The story mentions Sally Randolph carrying a small handgun for protection. How did firearm ownership during the 1930s compare with today, and what historical factors influenced those differences? The conversation between Steve and Sally reflects attitudes toward personal protection during the period in which the novel is set. How have firearm laws and public opinions changed over time and discuss the reasons behind those changes.
