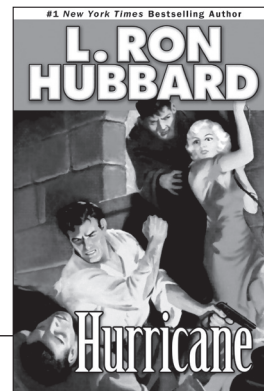


L. Ron Hubbard's *Hurricane* Discussion Guide



STORY SUMMARY & OVERVIEW

Wrongfully imprisoned on Devil's Island for a crime he did not commit, Captain Spar has spent years dreaming of escape and revenge against the man who betrayed him. When fate finally offers him a chance at freedom, he finds himself responsible not only for his own survival but also for the lives of innocent passengers caught in the path of a devastating Caribbean hurricane. The author combines maritime adventure, suspense and redemption in a fast-paced story where courage, leadership and justice are tested against the forces of both nature and human betrayal.

HISTORICAL CONTEXT: DEVIL'S ISLAND, CARIBBEAN SHIPPING AND HURRICANES

Hurricane is set in the French Caribbean during the 1930s, when merchant ships carried sugar, rum and other goods throughout the region. CHAPTER THREE: RETURNING TO COMMAND

📖 Why do mysterious places often become surrounded by legends and frightening stories? Hurricane Hill has developed a reputation that influences the decisions of everyone who hears about it. Compare this with famous historical locations that inspired myths, legends, or ghost stories.

📖 How does the engineer's unexpected death change the course of the voyage? One unforeseen event forces every character to adapt to new circumstances. Discuss other moments in history where a single incident dramatically altered the outcome of a larger event.

📖 Why does Captain Spar choose to sail toward Hurricane Hill despite the dangers? Spar must weigh known risks against uncertain alternatives. Discuss how people make difficult decisions when every available option involves danger.

CHAPTER FIVE: SECRETS WITHIN THE CASTLE
